

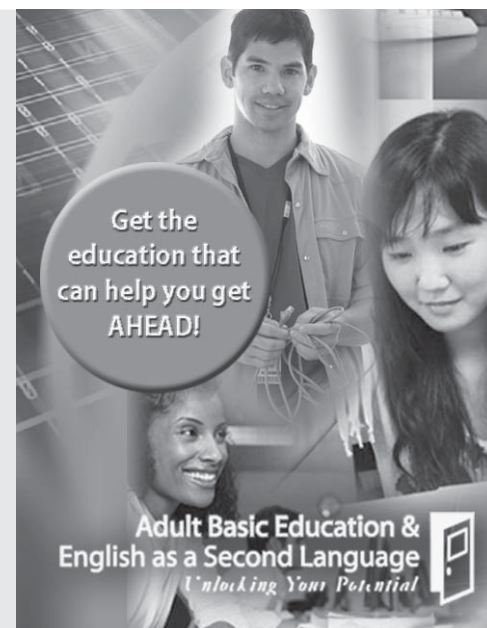
Adult Basic Education, ESL, GED

Adult Basic Education (ABE) and General Education Development (GED) preparation classes help those who may or may not have a high school diploma improve mathematics, reading and writing skills. ABE is designed to raise the abilities of adults so they can benefit from technical education and gain job-specific skills. In many cases students can start career education programs while also taking ABE classes. GED preparation classes help students planning to take the required five tests. **ABE and GED day and evening classes with monthly start dates are available at Bates and affiliated Tacoma locations.**

English as a Second Language (ESL) classes help adults learn to use the English language in their education, work and daily activities. At Bates ESL classes in speaking, listening, reading and writing are offered days and evenings. In some cases, students can start career education programs while also taking ESL classes. **Monthly start dates are available.**

Computer Networking Systems Technician • Downtown Campus • 7:15am - 3pm
Learn to install, configure and maintain network components such as routers, switches and servers to enable computer users to share information and resources. Students are encouraged to obtain Microsoft and Cisco certifications.

Computer Repair & Network Support • Downtown Campus • 3 - 9:30pm
Instruction includes operating systems, personal computer hardware maintenance, and Cisco fundamentals, including servers, routing and switching technologies.

Database Management & Development • Downtown Campus • 7:30am - 3:15pm
Database developers organize and manage information for corporations and organizations large and small. The curriculum offers a broad range of computer and software development skills that can open doors to a career in almost every industry.

Electrical Power & Process Automation • Downtown Campus • 7:15am - 3pm
Train for employment in the manufacturing industry. Learn electronics, electrical power distribution, motorized and wireless robotics controls, computer networking and mechanical systems.

Home Technology Integration • Downtown Campus • 7:15am - 3pm
